
Pentecost Term Early Years Newsletter

Finally we have some lovely sunny weather. Please <u>apply sun cream</u> <u>before school</u> and ensure that there is <u>only water in water bottles</u> as this will help hydrate more efficiently.

Hats are a good idea for when we learn outside, but not essential. <u>No sunglasses</u> please – these are a hazard if

tripping/falling/bumping into things. We are very sensible (much to some people's debate ⁽²⁾) and only allow the children out for short



periods when the weather is especially hot. We encourage drinking of water throughout the day and have plenty of spare cups/water bottles should they be needed. The children drink from cups in the dinner hall and are offered milk, along with their snack, at snack time, all contributing to staying hydrated so please don't worry about them. Any particular allergies, or bad hey-fever days, we control the length of time, if any, outside to help alleviate symptoms.



In other knowledge and understanding of the world news -<u>World</u> <u>Water Day</u> – Launched by the United Nations, fell during our Continents topic, so we have saved our World Water Day for the end of this term (and it is considerably warmer now). Again more info to be sent out about this nearer the time. We will be having a fun day using water to learn and explore, solve problems and maybe get a little wet (adult controlled). This also leads nicely into World Water Week which falls during the last week of the summer holidays this



year. By the time the children leave for their summer break, they will be able to tell you all about the water cycle, how to protect our water and the living things within it, so I hope they get plenty of opportunities over their break to tell you all about them [©].


<u>Transition</u>
